## **Sports Fans Collect**

You can always spot a sports fan in the crowd whether at the stadium or on the street—because they'll be the ones sporting head-to-toe branded attire that publicly broadcasts their affinity for a sport, team, or player. They are loud and proud in their support and put their money where their mouth is!

There is no doubt that the market for sports collectibles, merchandise, and memorabilia rides on the coattails of a sport or team's popularity. And with multiple platforms available for fans to live stream games, build their own fantasy teams, and follow their favorite teams and players on social media, the market is exploding to further expand its fan base.

According to Research and Markets (www.research andmarkets.com), the Licensed Sports Merchandise market in the U.S., from apparel to footwear and everything in between, was estimated at \$5.5 billion in 2022. That's a lot of T-shirts, Styrofoam fingers, athletic gear, bobbleheads, banners, baseball caps, and sneakers! Leading the pack is NFL-branded apparel and merchandise, followed by the NBA. Among the most popular NFL franchises for fan-purchased merch? The Dallas Cowboys, followed by the Raiders. The San Francisco 49ers, Philadelphia Eagles, and Pittsburgh Steelers round out the top five, according to surveyed retailers.

Not surprisingly, sports fans are also collectors of sports memorabilia in what has grown into a multibillion-dollar market of its own. According to Market Decipher's (www.marketdecipher.com/report/sportscollectibles-market) recently published report, "Size, Statistics, Growth Trend Analysis, and Forecast Report, 2022-2032," over 60 million collectors are involved in the purchase/trading of sports memorabilia in what was estimated as a \$26 billion market in 2021 and is projected to experience a compound annual growth rate of 21.8% for a \$227.2 billion market by 2023! This is exclusive of the sale of NFTs, which the Report estimated at \$1.4 billion in 2022 and which they forecast to reach \$92 billion by 2032. Yet, these stats do not even begin to cover fan-based collections such as game ticket stubs, autographed items, team mementos, and promotional giveaways; items collected over time the old fashion way - by paying to be a fan in the seats and waiting outside the locker room for an autograph.

One has only to follow the mainstream news to see who and what is driving the high-end sports memorabilia market. Michael Jordan, LeBron James, Mickey Mantle, Honus Wagner, and Bill Russell are just a few of the headliners breaking records off the field at auction these days. Top sales items include game-worn jerseys and sneakers, mint-condition trading cards, and personal mementos. A quick snapshot of what has sold at auction in just the first six months of 2023 can be found on page 14 in this month's issue.

When it comes to sneakers, Air Jordans, like their namesake, dominate the field at auction. The popularity of the Netflix/ESPN-produced documentary miniseries *The Last Dance*, and *Air*, the recently released movie about Nike's signing of Michael Jordan and the creation of the Air Jordan sneaker, have created a wave of nostalgia for this golden era of the 1980s and the NBA greats so many current collectors grew up watching. In 2020, a pair of game-worn Air Jordan 1 sneakers brought in a record auction price of \$560,000, nearly four times the initial estimate. In 2021, a pair of Air Jordans worn in Jordan's fifth

NBA game in his rookie season with the Bulls sold for \$1.47 million, and more recently, a pair of *Last Dance* trainers, worn during Game 2 of 1998 NBA Finals, realized \$2.2 million at auction, although falling below the auction house estimate of \$4 million. Based on these results and what appears to be significant buyer interest, expect to see more game-worn attire from GOAT athletes come out to play at auction in the coming years for this second shot at immortality.

While sports memorabilia dealers and specialty auction houses have traditionally been the market makers in this segment, the heat of the current market has not escaped the notice of such higher-end auction houses as Sotheby's, Christie's, and Heritage Auctions, who are now running headliner sports auctions of their own, setting records and generating publicity in the process.

While some fans collect and invest in sports memorabilia to own something tangible from a team or player they follow, others look at the escalating values of sports memorabilia and see it as an asset and 401K investment. Yet, spending upwards of a million dollars or more on something rare and memorable puts the really coveted stuff beyond the financial reach of the majority of collectors.

One recent concept that has emerged in the high-end sports memorabilia market is what's known as "fractional buying;" essentially, purchasing shares of ownership in something that is financially above your means to purchase outright. This is not unlike buying shares in a company, where you can invest in ownership shares and trade them on a platform that tracks and trades, based on the market, the asset's value. A portfolio of fractional shares in high-valued sports memorabilia items offers 401K investors diversification and a hedge against inflation; a nominal investment by a fan of a few hundred dollars or more gives them bragging rights to owning a piece of sports history or something from their personal legend; however, like NFTs, the true collector has nothing to put out in their display case to show for their investment.

You will also learn more about appraising and how sports collectibles' market values vary from Judy Gonyeau's one-on-one interview with Antiques Roadshow Appraiser Simeon Lipman, share the history behind and growing collectability of bobbleheads in an article from WorthPoint, and take a journey with Doug Kelly to explore sports-related give-aways.

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

during Cruisin' the Coast<sup>®</sup>. For the fourth time, Cruisin' the Coast was voted America's Best Car Event, according to USA Today's "10Best.com." After several weeks of online public voting, Cruisin' the Coast came in first place in the car show category of the USA Today 10 Best

Readers' Choice Awards for 2022. Cruisin' the Coast is a week-long, family-friendly series of

In addition to the Buick Skylark convertible, a rare numbers-matching 1966 Chevrolet Impala station wagon with a 427 cubic inch V-8 engine and factory 4-speed





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### WORLD MARKETPLACE NEWS

YAHOO FINANCE – Collectible vintage photos are emerging as investable assets. Many of the most valuable vintage photos are



sports-related. While fine art pieces are often found in the portfolios of the rich and famous, vintage photographs occupy a different space, more closely adjacent to the world of rare collectibles. In 2020, a 110-yearold photo of legendary baseball player Ty Cobb sold for an eyepopping \$390,000. Limited supply and high demand have

made this an up-and-coming investment. When buying, be sure there is careful and trusted authentication backed up with provenance. Keep an eye out for made-in-the-day photographs vs. a new print to add value.

AUCTION NEWS – Competition between a phone and a room bidder sent this "Chinese carved hardwood clothing stand" from its token estimate of \$500-700 to \$830,000 at an upstate New York saleroom on June 22. With 28% buyer's premium added the price was close

to \$1.1m. A traditional part of a marriage dowry, the most decorative examples were carved with symbols promoting marital bliss and longevity. In this case, the openwork panels are carved with repeated ruyi "good fortune" symbols to the terminals with a phoenix. The latter could be key to its appeal. Just as the dragon became the symbol of the emperor, in the imperial household the use of the phoenix was synonymous with the empress.



ANTIQUES TRADE GAZETTE – The latest of the London auction houses to increase its premium fees is Bonhams, which changed both the percentages of its premium structure and thresholds. Effectively, this means an extra 1% premium is charged on the vast bulk of the lots sold at Bonhams. The changes apply to sales in the UK, France,



Belgium and at Bonhams Skinner in the U.S. which all have a new structure starting with the 28% fee but with the thresholds varying by currency. These changes follow Sotheby's adjustment to its buyer's premium in February, followed by Phillips in March, and then Christie's in April. Bohnams

now stands at 28% for purchases up to \$50,000, 27% for purchases between 50,000 and \$1M, 21% for amounts between \$1M and \$6M, and 14.5% for purchases over \$6M. Sotheby's is 26% up to \$1M, 20% from \$1M to \$4.5M, and 13.9% over \$4.5M. Christies is 26% up to \$1M, 21% between \$1M and \$6M, and 15% over \$6M.

BLEEDING COOL – An Omega Level Mutant has appeared as PCS unveiled its latest Marvel video game statue. The newest Marvel video game statue features the X-Men's Storm, bringing the thunder and lightning with her with this impressive 1:3 scale statue. Coming in at 27.5" tall, Storm's designs are inspired by her appearance in Marvel's *Future Revolution.* Marvel and X-Men fans don't need to know the game to fall in love with this statue, but she is not cheap and comes in at \$1,180.



BELFAST TELEGRAPH – The preserved head of an Egyptian mummy is currently on display in a Belfast antique store called On The Square Emporium. Store owner Justin Lowry, said, "As far as I am aware, this is the only mummy's head that is for sale [in Northern Ireland], or has been for private sale, in the last few decades." A local buyer has already been secured for the ancient item, but it will remain



on display until the end of September so the public can come and see it. The head had initially been brought to the UK by a British soldier during World War I, and remained in the possession of the soldier's family, where it was kept under a glass dome for safekeeping. But, because some visitors didn't like looking at the embalmed body part, it ended up being a head has been carbon dated by amount to

**put away in a cupboard.** The head has been carbon-dated by experts to between 800 BC and 750 BC, which coincided with the collapse of civilizations dating from the late Bronze Age.

NYT – Christie's is facing criticism for its sale of jewelry from an estate partly built on profits made from the purchase of Jewish businesses during the Holocaust. The record-breaking sale of jewelry from the estate of Heidi Horten generated \$202 million. Horten was an Austrian heiress whose husband, Helmut, built a retail



empire in Germany partly by taking advantage of Nazi policies that forced Jewish businesspeople to sell their companies. Christie's promised in spring to donate a portion of its proceeds to further Holocaust research and education. But the auction house has struggled to find organizations willing to accept money from the sale, which went forward despite the objections of Jewish groups. Some organizations rebuked Christie's for the sale and asked collectors to take their business elsewhere. The Tel Aviv Museum of Art announced it had decided against participating with Christie's in an event designed to look at restitution policies for objects lost by Jews during the Holocaust. The company has not said what amount of fees from the sales it is planning to donate. A second sale of jewelry from the Horten collection containing roughly 300 lots is scheduled for November, but as of July 11, the second auction is not on their online calendar.



AMSTERDAM – The Rijksmuseum is set to return six objects currently in its collection to Sri Lanka this year, the first time colonial objects from the Rijksmuseum collection will be returned. Of note is the return of the ceremonial Cannon of Kandy, made of bronze, silver and gold, and inlaid with rubies. Troops from the Dutch

East India Company looted the cannon during the siege and plunder of Kandy in 1765. It was later gifted to William V, Prince of Orange, for his cabinet of curiosities in The Hague. It has been part of the Rijksmuseum collection since 1800. The relationship and exchanges of knowledge built up between the two nations in the fields of research and common history constitute a strong foundation for the future.

PHILADELPHIA – The Lynnewood Hall Preservation Foundation now owns the deed to its namesake, a magnificent 19th century

mansion on 34 acres outside of Philadelphia. Designed by Horace Trumbauer for Peter Widener, a wealthy industrialist, Lynnewood has been left derelict for decades. Now the restoration begins.

Other than that, use it as a display. The clock runs for 12 hours. The alarm function is not working. There is some age-related yellowing on the original Paper/Cloth dial. Some age-related patina on the brass. There is a barely noticeable dent on top (pictured). See photos as part of the description. Made of solid Brass. Name brand stamp logo is visible on the bottom." **JK:** Henri-Eugène-Adrien Farcot was primarily known for two things. First, he was an avid balloonist. Second, he was a brilliant French clockmaker. He is most famous for his conical pendulum clocks. Nevertheless, all of his clocks are quite desirable to collectors.

Farcot famously produced elaborate clocks for world fairs and exhibitions throughout his career. One of those was the Exposition Universelle of 1867 in Paris, France. Another was the London Exhibition of 1862 in London, England. As a mechanical engineer, he was awarded 19 patents, 16 of which are linked to horology.

His clocks have been known to sell for anywhere between a few hundred dollars to \$8,000 and higher. Because of the quality and details put into this example—even though it is not one of his more desirable clocks—it is no wonder bidders were willing to put in the time and effort to win this lot. The enthusiasm amongst the final bidders did push the price slightly higher but not to the point of overpaying.

Farcot's balloonist career was also amazing. In fact, he flew a mail balloon from Paris to Belgium when Paris was under siege in the early 1870s. The balloon was called the Louis Blanc. He later penned a book about the experience.

**\$692 (Bids 50, Bidders 16) Antique Vintage Miniature Brass Sinumbra Oil Lamp – W. Carleton, Boston.** Up for auction today is an estate fresh Antique Vintage Miniature Brass Sinumbra Oil Lamp Signed on the brass tag – "MANUFACTURED BY W. CARLETON BOSTON." The lamp measures 12 1/2 inches tall and 3 7/8 inches square on the bottom. The lamp has been electrified as pictured. No breaks, repairs, or restorations outside of what they did for electrification. The small cap to the fuel reservoir on top of the font is missing. (photos: c.1901).





**JK:** The Argand oil lamp design was first patented by Aime Argand in 1780 yet didn't really become popular until the 1820s. Argand's lamp was brighter than earlier oil lamps, but it still had its flaws.

Another type of lamp called the "sinumbra" was developed within the same period. It was patented in France around 1809-1810. Its original devel-

opment is attributed to Benjamin Thompson, who was an American-born physicist living in England at the time. The lamp's name means "without shadow" and refers to the lack of a shadow-casting font (sometimes spelled fount) or the container that holds the oil.

The "W. Carleton" on the lamp in the above auction listing refers to William Carleton (1797-1876). He was a prominent manufacturer of predominantly brass items. His business was based in Charlestown, Massachusetts. He is not to be confused with the British writer named William Carleton, who lived during roughly the same time period (1794-1869).

French Sinumbra lamps can sell for \$800-\$1,500 and more for a pair in excellent condition. This lamp sold for a good price, although the word "miniature" may have attracted the high number of bidders that participated. The size of this lamp is within the norm for what it is but its early date and lack of a complete overhaul when converted for electricity make it that much more worth the investment.

#### World record for a ruby, \$34.8 million, Sotheby's



The extraordinary "Estrela de Fura 55.22"—a 55.22carat Mozambique ruby sold for \$34.8 million at a Magnificent Jewels auction held June 8th by Sotheby's in New York City. It was a new world auction record

for a ruby and a record for any colored gemstone ever sold at auction. Moments later, "The Eternal Pink"—the most vivid pink diamond to ever come to market—also achieved \$34.8 million. It was a world auction record price for a fancy purplish-pink diamond.

#### Frank Herbert's *Dune*, \$22,500, PBA Galleries



A first edition copy of Frank Herbert's book *Dune* sold for \$22,500 at a Science Fiction, Fantasy & Horror auction held June 1st by PBA Galleries in Berkeley, CA. Also, the *Dark Tower* series by Stephen King also brought \$22,500; *The Lathe of Heaven* by Ursula K. Le Guin settled at \$10,000;



Thile sports memorabilia buying at all value levels ran rampant during COVID, the first half of 2023 is showing no signs of a market slowing down. Here are just a few of the big-ticket items that have sold in the first half of this year (prices include buyer's premium):



#### **Morphy Auctions**

An intact 1952 Topps baseball wax-pack "brick" sold for a staggering \$873,300 at Morphy Auctions' Feb. 1-3, 2023, auction. The brick contains eight factory-sealed 5-cent wax packs. In turn, each of the packs contains five baseball cards, which some experts believe could be from Topps' first series. The sealed brick's ownership could be traced most recently to a 1991 transaction in Seattle. It was sold to a private collector who wishes to remain anonymous.



#### Sotheby's

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A pair of Air Jordans worn by Michael Jordan became the world's most expensive sneakers when they sold for \$2.2 million at a Sotheby's online auction this past April. The sneakers, officially dubbed the 1998 NBA Finals Game 2 Air Jordan 13s, were worn by the basketball star during his last year with the Chicago Bulls. The black-and-red shoes are the only complete pair of sneakers worn by Jordan in an NBA Finals game to be authenticated, Sotheby's says.



#### Sotheby's

An iconic Kobe Bryant jersey sold for a record \$5.8 million at Sotheby's in February. This Adidas jersey was worn by the late basketball star during 25 games of his 2007-2008 season and is the only gold jersey Kobe wore in the 2008 NBA Playoffs leading to the 2008 NBA Finals – including when the Lakers were crowned Western Conference Champions. In this jersey, Kobe advanced to the 2008 NBA Finals for the first time since Shaquille O'Neal was traded from the Lakers. This was an important moment in Kobe's career, in his conquest to win his first title without O'Neal. According to Sotheby's, it is now the most expensive Kobe Bryant item ever sold at auction.

#### Mile High Card Co.

An exceptional Babe Ruth/Lou Gehrig signed ONL Heydler Baseball (PSA/DNA 8 NM/MT, JSA), signed in 1925, sold for \$59,887.47 at Mile High Card Co.'s Spring Auction in April. Though they were the most formidable tandem in baseball for 12 years, both players passed away early in life, Gehrig in 1941 and Ruth in 1948, leaving a short supply of quality examples for the collecting public.



#### Goldin


A signed and inscribed LeBron James jersey from the 2014 NBA Finals matchup with the San Antonio Spurs sold for \$192,000 at Goldin this past April. The white Adidas size 2XL jersey hails from James' final Finals with the Heat (capstone of an NBA record 4th straight Finals appearance for the franchise), and more specifically from Game 4 when James led with 28 points. It includes James' black marker inscription, "LeBron James / vs. Spurs 6/12/14 / Finals GM 4."





#### PWCC

Barry Bonds' 1999 Fleer Ultra Masterpiece one-of-one card sold for \$63,000 at PWCC's May Premier Auction to become his highest-selling trading card at public auction, according to public data sets. This record-setter is considered one of Bonds' scarcest trading cards in existence. The Masterpiece parallel features an image of the slugger mid-swing with holofoil lettering and full bleed edges. PSA graded the card a Near Mint 7. Barry Bonds was one of the most gifted hitters in baseball. As a member of the "Killer Bees" on the Pirates, he made the Pirates relevant for the first time in over a decade.



#### Hunt Auctions

A Babe Ruth baseball bat he used about 103 years ago sold to a private buyer for \$1.85 million, the most ever for a bat. The previous record was \$1.68 million, for another Ruth bat. Part of the reason the recordbreaking bat sold for so much was because it is the "only known example to offer photographic corroboration," said the auction house. "The 'Polo Grounds' bat, as it's colloquially known for the stadium the New York Yankees played their home games in until 1922, is matched to a 1921 photo of Ruth swinging it," wrote ESPN.



#### **SCP** Auctions

A 1911 T205 Gold Border (Piedmont) Christy Mathewson—PSA NM-MT 8 (Only One Higher) realized \$214,579 at SCP's 2023 Spring Premier Auction. Nicknamed "Big Six," "the Christian Gentleman," "Matty," and "the Gentleman's Hurler," Mathewson was a Major League Baseball right-handed pitcher who played 17 seasons with the New York Giants. At 6 ft 1 in (1.85 m) tall and weighing 195 pounds (88 kg), Mathewson was among the most dominant pitchers in baseball history and ranks in the all-time top 10 in several key pitching categories, including wins, shutouts, and earned run average. In 1936, Mathewson was elected into the Baseball Hall of Fame as one of its first five members.



#### **Grey Flannel Auctions**

The autographed NHL jersey that was worn by Wayne Gretzky when he recorded his last NHL point sold for \$715,120 with Grey Flannel Auctions in June. Gretzky wore the record-setting No. 99 jersey while recording his 2,857th and final NHL point as a member of the New York Rangers on April 18, 1999. No other player in NHL history has reached 2,000 points. The jersey was displayed in Madison Square Garden's "Defining Moments" Museum from 2016 to 2019, but this auction is the first time it was offered publicly. It was the highest sale price for a U.S.-based hockey jersey, eclipsing Mike Eruzione's 1980 "Miracle On Ice" jersey that sold for \$657,250 in 2013.

Michael Jordan's "Flu Game" sneakers auctioned for \$1.38 million this June at Goldin Auctions. The infamous "Flu Game" was Game 5 of the 1997 NBA Finals. Despite being ill with what some say was actually food poisoning, Jordan scored 38 points, 7 rebounds, and 5 assists in more than 44 minutes that night to lead the Bulls past the Jazz in Utah. Then he gave his signed sneakers to Jazz ball boy Preston Truman, who'd curried favor with Jordan by bringing him applesauce before games. The Bulls went on to clinch the 1997 title in six games. Truman held onto the shoes for 15 years before consigning them to Grey Flannel Auctions in 2013; when they sold for \$104,765, it demolished the record for game-worn shoes across sports. Ten years later, the same sneakers have appreciated by more than 1,200%.

#### Heritage Auctions

Boston Red Sox immortal Ted Williams' Baseball Hall of Fame induction ring gifted to the great upon his entry into Cooperstown on July 25, 1966, sold for \$444,000 at Heritage's three-day Spring Sports Catalog Auction in May. The Balfour-made ring still in its original presentation box realized more than four times what it brought in 2012 during an auction of Williams' memorabilia held at Fenway Park.

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#### Heritage Auctions

2003 Upper Deck Exquisite Collection LeBron Īames (Exquisite Rookie Patch Autographs-Level 1) #78 BGS Mint 9, Auto 10 - #'d 74/99 sold for \$324,000 at Heritage Auctions' 2023 June 24 Sports Showcase Auction. Beyond the supreme notoriety of the subject, this particular issue likewise represents a dramatic step forward, one of the all-time greatest basketball brands ever produced. The Upper Deck Exquisite Collection saw no shortage of doubters when it debuted with \$500 price tags, but today there's nary a collector active during that period that doesn't harbor regret at failing to purchase every available box when he had

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

the chance. Just ninety-nine examples of this rookie format, pairing a patch of game-worn jersey and a bold blue sharpie signature, were inserted at random within those high-dollar boxes, and they are today considered the most desirable of all LeBron rookies, bar none.

#### **Robert Edward Auctions**

A 1933 R319 Goudey #149 Babe Ruth trading card sold for \$11,700 at Robert Edward Auctions' June 2023 Encore Auction. Babe Ruth's career as an American professional baseball player spanned 22 seasons, from 1914 through 1935. In various surveys and rankings, Ruth has been named the greatest baseball player of all time. In 1933, Goudey produced a 240-card set, also called "Big League Chewing Gum." These cards, issued with bubble gum in each pack, were the first baseball gum cards. This example with a red background has vibrant colors, outstanding registration, moderate corner wear, and centering slightly toward the bottom left. Graded FAIR 1.5 by SGC.






#### Mile High Card Company

A 1959 Topps Football 1st Series Unopened Vending Box Group of (2) Banded sold for \$41,270.40 at Mile High Auction Company's Spring 2023 Auction in April. With Topps taking over the sports trading card market from Bowman, the late 1950s became a bit of an experimental era for the company. The 1959 series delivered the first pasteboards of #4 Max McGee, 51 Sam Huff, 103 Alex Karras, 116 Jerry Kramer, 132 Jim Parker, and 140 Bobby Mitchell. The featured pair of untouched vending boxes hails from the first series, which houses the cards of #1 J. Unitas, 10 J. Brown, 20 Gifford, 23 Starr, 40 Layne, 51 Huff, 55 Berry, and 82 Hornung.

#### Memory Lane


A 1965 Yogi Berra Hillerich & Bradsby Game-Used Bat PSA GU9 sold for \$46,126.60 at Memory Lane's Spring '23 Rarities Auction. Over his 19 years in the big leagues, he batted .285 with 358 home runs and 1,430 RBIs. And more significantly, Berra won three American League MVP awards when the likes of Ted Williams, Al Kaline, and Mickey Mantle were on top of their games. Yogi spent 19 years behind the plate for the New York Yankees (1946-1963) and the New York Mets (1965), though only appearing in four games for the Mets. Likely, a weapon of heavy practice and game use, this superbly

preserved B211 Louisville Slugger Bat hails from Berra's 1965 season with the Mets and shows unbelievable wear and game use. PSA has noted that this bat originated from a February 2, April 5, or April 26th order placed by Berra. It is one of the final bats ever used by Berra during his career.



#### **Grey Flannel Auctions**

A 1933 Woody English Inaugural MLB All-Star Game-Used National League Flannel Uniform sold for \$48,871 in June through Grey Flannel Auctions. The 1933 Major League Baseball All-Star Game was the firstever All-Star Game in baseball history. It was played on July 6, 1933, at Comiskey Park. The success of the 1933 All-Star Game led to it becoming an annual event, and it has since become one of the most beloved and anticipated events in baseball. Woody English was considered one of the top shortstops of his era. Offensively, English was known for his ability to make contact and get on base. This was the only time in the history of the



# The Diamond King of Baseball Artists

ost long-time readers of *Sports Collectors Digest* know the name Dick Perez as well as they know the names Ted Williams, Mickey Mantle, and Sandy Koufax. He is arguably the most accomplished baseball artist of all time. When asked several years ago about how many baseball paintings he had done in his lifetime, he responded, "Somewhere between 2 to 3,000." Many of those paintings have been turned into baseball cards and postcards, thus the familiarity with his name and work by collectors.

#### Famous Experience

Over the years, Perez has been the "Official Artist" of the National Baseball Hall

of Fame and Museum in Cooperstown, the Philadelphia Phillies, and The Roberto Clemente Foundation. Two former Presidents commissioned baseball paintings from him. Ronald Reagan asked for one of Hall of Famer Grover Cleveland Alexander, whom he had portrayed in the 1952 film, *The Winning Team.* Bill Clinton had one done of Pittsburgh Pirates Hall of Fame shortstop Arky Vaughn, a fellow Arkansan. He did a commissioned painting for Ichiro Suzuki of a Japanese stickball game after Suzuki saw one at the HOF that he had done of a game in the streets of New York City. Suzuki, one of baseball's greatest players, is known as a great student of the history of the game. Perez's coffee table book, *The Immortals, An Art Collection of Baseball's Best*, contains over 1,400 reproductions of his work in 560 pages.

#### A Painter is Born

A native of San Lorenzo, Puerto Rico, Perez grew up in Harlem, then later moved to Philadelphia with his family. The Puerto Rico connection was instrumental in his work for the Clemente Foundation; each year he paints a portrait of the Roberto Clemente Award winner. Having grown up mostly in New York City, he lists Mickey Mantle as his childhood hero and all-time favorite player probably the reason Mantle has been one of most prominent his subjects over the years.

Living and working in Philadelphia, he has worked for the Phillies in some capacity dating to 1972. They honored him with an art gallery featuring 33 of his baseball paintings on permanent display at Citizens Bank Park, covering all Hall of Famers with connections to the city, such as Mike Schmidt, Chief Bender (Philadelphia As), Reggie Jackson (who grew up in Philly), and Phillies executive Pat Gillick.

#### Diamond Kings/Turkey Reds/ Allen & Ginter


His influence in the baseball card collectibles hobby started with the Diamond Kings art cards he produced for Donruss from 1982 to 1996. Each season, one player was selected to represent every team, and these were the first cards in the set. By '96, the card industry had changed dramatically, overcome by too many brands massproducing cards, leading to market saturation, and Donruss soon became a financial casualty. The brand would change hands, eventually disappearing from the scene for a few years. It returned as an offshoot of Panini and was produced without a major league license, so the cards contain no MLB logos, including the Diamond Kings cards.

After they broke from Perez, the Diamond Kings eventually became available in their

own boxes and sets, no longer just as inserts within the Donruss packs. At that point, they employed several different artists to work on each set. They were good, but they never had quite the same appeal as the originals. With a careful eye, you can spot the name Perez at the bottom of his cards. Perez returned to baseball cards with Topps in 2007, doing

Perez returned to baseball cards with Topps in 2007, doing Turkey Red cards, including cards of his favorite player, Mantle. He also did some insert cards for the Allen & Ginter brand as well. Topps, which now holds the license for all MLB cards, has several art cards available in its lineup today, including the very popular Allen & Ginter and Gypsy Queen brands. While art cards have been around in one form or another since the late 1800s, a great deal of credit should go to Perez for

what is out there now. Part of their appeal over the years is the artwork, and that they are a great piece to get signed, for those who collect baseball autographs.

For the most part, the Perez Diamond Kings are not that expensive except for those that have been signed by Hall of Famers. The lineup of cards each year varied in the artwork and the players selected, and while most are big-name stars, some are guys who had a brief touch

with baseball immortality for a few seasons. Most of the early Perez Diamond King cards range from \$1-\$5. The exception would be the final year Perez did the Diamond Kings in 1996. The cards were numbered on the back to 10,000, which makes them more valuable in the resale market, selling from \$5 to \$20, depending on the player. It is not unusual at a big card show to find some in common boxes. Some Diamond Kings were also made as larger cards, available through the mail at the time. You occasionally see a few of these at shows. They can be a little pricier, as they are scarcer and numbered on the back.

I have always liked the art cards for getting nice, clean, collectible autographs. If the cards have been signed, of course, their value will probably shoot up, based on the player and what kind of a signer he is. As we know, once a player goes into the Hall of Fame, the price usually increases, and in some instances, the availability of the player to sign changes as well, usually based on what they are getting paid. All you have

to do is look at the prices charged for them at The National. I scoured the internet, looking mostly for signed Diamond King cards from the '82-83 sets, and here are examples of some of the prices that I found: Phil Niekro (HOF) for \$15, Tom Seaver (HOF) for \$80, Gary Carter (HOF) \$92, Kent Hrbek \$23, Carlton Fisk (HOF) \$70, Pete Rose \$92, Willie Stargell (HOF) \$120, Ron Guidry \$32, Steve Garvey \$42, Len Barker \$5, Dwight Evans \$50, and George Brett (HOF) \$150. Unsigned cards of Brett were listed at \$4-\$5.

#### Perez-Steele Baseball Hall of Fame Postcards

Starting in 1980, in conjunction with the Hall of Fame, Perez put out a series of art postcards. There were 253 in total, in 15 published series, running until 2001. Each card is of a Hall of Famer and numbered to 10,000. They can be purchased today, unsigned, with prices from \$2 to over \$100, depending on the player. When these cards came out, Mickey Mantle, Ted Williams, and Joe DiMaggio were still alive, and since they were all prolific signers, there are several cards available with their signatures. Looking on the internet and in card catalogs from top dealers, you can find DiMaggio for \$200-\$250, Mantle for \$235-\$500, and Williams for \$150-\$200. The most expensive one I saw was former Dodger catcher Roy Campanella for \$700. Paralyzed in an automobile accident, it is said that he did sign items before his death with the help of an autopen, so you must assume that this is where they came from. There were several Yogi Berra and Whitey Ford cards running in the \$50-\$60 range, with Carl Yastrzemski for \$100, Willie Mays for \$150, and Sandy Koufax for \$200.

#### Perez-Steele Baseball Hall of Fame Great Moments

These are my favorites. They come in  $5\frac{3}{4}$ " x 8" full-color cards with a greenish border and a gold nameplate. Designed after the original T-3 Turkey

Red cards, they are each numbered to 5,000. On the back is a story about the Hall of Famer and the picture on the front. There are 96 of them, released in eight series of boxed sets from 1984-1993. Unsigned, they range from \$4 to \$60. The most expensive one I found is #87, featuring Willie Mays, Mickey Mantle, and Duke Snider, the three great center fielders who ruled New York in the 1950s. Signed copies of this one run in the \$500-\$700 range. There are some other cards that

contain more than one player, including one of Jackie Robinson and Pee Wee Reese (#91), and one of the famed Cubs infield of Tinker to Evers to Chance (#40). I found some copies of the Robinson-Reese card, signed by Pee Wee, selling in the \$60-\$80 range. Some other signed cards were Joe Morgan (\$60), Yaz (\$80), and Willie Mays (\$150). Duke Snider, Stan Musial, Yogi Berra, and Al Kaline sell in the \$40-\$80 range. To me, these are great deals on some of the best players in baseball history. You can purchase the different complete boxed sets online with the price depending on what cards are in the set.

One of my favorites is card #1 of Babe Ruth in a Red Sox uniform, which goes for about \$20-\$50, unsigned of course. Most everything you find of Ruth is as a Yankee, so I think it will make this one an even more valuable collectible in the long run.

# The Diamond King: The Film

Kickstarter funding for the Dick Perez Documentary being produced by Award-winning Documentary Filmmaker Marq Evans successfully ended on June 3, 2023, raising \$59,232 from 295 backers in just 34 days - twice what they requested. With this type of fast response to a short campaign, the film is on its way.

The Diamond King is a feature documentary about the history of baseball as told through the life and works of baseball's "Picasso," Dick Perez. According to Evans, the film came about when his son, Jude, began collecting cards and Evans became curious about who was painting the images for the Diamond King cards. "Dick was the official artist of the Baseball Hall of Fame for over 20 years and has painted the entire history of the game - from the Knickerbocker era until now. He has painted every baseball Hall of Famer, a project he continues to this day at the age of 82. Through Dick's work, you see how the game has changed - from the ballparks to the uniforms, the crowds, the signage, and, of course, the diversity of its players."

Said Evans, "When I read about Dick's journey, coming to New York at age six and learning English and about America through the game of baseball, and his inspiring life






story, I thought there was the potential to make a film about baseball through his life and work. ... I send Dick a blind email just introducing myself and seeing if he was interested in discussing the concept. To my delight, he said he'd be happy to talk. We really hit it off right away and he has been a great participant and collaborator in this whole process."


The Kickstarter rewards for the project included copies of the newly-updated *The Immortals/New Immortals* by Dick Perez, a special card set created just for the fundraiser-*Diamond Immortals*-with only 499 sets of these 22 *Diamond Immortals* cards at the \$250 level, the first set of *Diamond Immortals* - #1 of 499 at the \$500 level, and the original painting Perez did of Shohei Ohtani for the *Diamond Immortals* collection at the single \$5,000 level, sure to be a very worthy investment in both the film and the donor's collection!

Next up is finishing production, marketing, and editing of the film with a hoped-for completion date of June 2024. While funding for the film is ongoing, this program is a way for fans to participate and allow time for the final financial support to kick-in.

I f you were roaming the earth in the 1950s, 1960s, or 1970s, you most likely spent at least a little time rummaging through cereal boxes or packs of hot dogs in search of sports giveaways – or you knew someone who did. Those baseball cards and hockey coins showed your favorite players doing their thing, and best of all, they were free.

Wait ... were they free? Well ... yes, if you ignore the fact that they came on the back of candy boxes and in jars of peanut butter – which you (or Mom and Dad) had to buy to get the coveted prize. But even that didn't slow kids down much because the products to be purchased often were things such as six-packs of soda pop or boxes of sugary sweet cereal, which hit the spot nicely as you enjoyed your new Catfish Hunter or Gordie Howe card.

Collectors and dealers call these items by various names: promos, giveaways, oddballs, premiums, and so forth. What ties them all together is that they weren't available for purchase individually – one needed to cough up the cash for the item that the giveaway came

with, or was attached to, or was inside of. This business of getting consumers to buy a product by offering a free prize goes back more than 100 years, and includes such items as the cards that came in packs of cigarettes in the early 20th century. One of the most famous of these is the T-206 Honus Wagner baseball card, produced in 1909 by the American Tobacco Company. It's generally thought that only about 50 of them exist, and when one changes hands, the numbers tend to boggle the mind. Last year, an example graded 2 (on a scale of 1 to 10) by a card grading/certification company sold in a private sale for more than \$7 million.

Not bad for a freebie.

#### **BELOW THE RADAR**

Compared to regular-issue sports collectibles, such as cards, giveaways, and promo items generally are more difficult to find. They also tend not to be on most collectors' radar screens. "It probably is a neglected area ... most collectors go for the major sets, the things that are more prevalent," says South Carolina collector Tony Greco. "Packs of baseball cards or complete sets, those kinds of things. I think giveaways and premiums were often set aside, or just thrown out because they [weren't seen as being] as important. And of course, they weren't produced in mass quantities like the [mainstream] cards were

... they're harder to find. So I'd say they're a more neglected part of the collecting world."

Greco has been at this for quite a while. "I've been collecting since I was a child, I grew up in the suburbs of Philadelphia in the 1960s. I started expanding my collecting by looking for more than just the

regular issue Topps cards ... I started looking for the food issue cards, and other things that were giveaways with other products. It just became an obsession with me."

Along with being paired with consumer products, sports items also have been given out free at sporting events for generations. Around the same time that the T-206 Wagner card was produced, the Sen-Sen gum company produced a cardboard "counter" that likely was handed out at baseball games. At two inches wide, it fit into the palm of the hand perfectly and allowed fans to keep close track of the action on the field by moving little dials for runs, hits, and errors. It also enabled Sen-Sen to hawk its gum, showing the product name on the

front and a pack of the stuff on the back.

Other items were produced that were miniatures of sports equipment, which would be given out as samples by sporting goods salesmen to customers and prospects. During the 1950s and '60s, the Manhattan Rubber company promoted its line of bowling balls with a two-inch wide plastic miniature, complete with the little finger and thumb holes drilled out. It came with a small plastic display ring, all placed inside a box that touted the ball's features. The top of the box, interestingly, had "To" and "From" printed on it, along with blank lines that presumably enabled a salesman to write his name for the prospective customer; a

sort of three-dimensional business card. The example shown here, complete and in original condition, was obtained by the author at a North Carolina antique show for just \$5.


Cracker Jack, of course, is famous for its "Toy Prize Inside!" boxes of its product, but for sports collectors, the company's 1914-1915 giveaways are head and shoulders above the rest. In 1912, the producers of the confection began putting toy prizes in the boxes to appeal to children, and a couple of years later, added cards of baseball players to the mix. These 2.25-inch wide cards are now highly prized by collectors, as they included such legends as Walter Johnson, Ty Cobb, and Christy Mathewson. Even battered, worn examples often sell for thousands of

dollars, and high-grade cards can run into the six figures. Adding to the challenge is the fact that many examples are stained from being inside the boxes with the caramel-coated popcorn and peanuts.

Much more reasonably priced (and far easier to find) is the reprint set that Cracker Jack put out in 1993 as part of the brand's 100th anniversary. The reprint cards were smaller-just 1.25 inches wideand came in a set of 24 that included many of the stars from the original set. Cracker Jack also offered an embossed collector album to hold the cards, along with a fact booklet on the cards.

#### **CHOW TIME**

Everything from bread to Jell-O to snack cakes have been used with sports giveaways, and manufacturers sometimes had to come up with creative ways to include the giveaway. In the early 1960s, York Peanut Butter inserted octagonal cards of National Hockey League (NHL) players in its jars, tucking the prizes up inside the lid of the jar. Fortunately for collectors, they placed a liner over the cards to protect them from peanut butter damage. The cards also were inserted into packages of the company's salted peanuts.

Armour hot dog coins made their debut in 1955, and being plastic were able to withstand being in food packaging better than cardboard items. The coins were 1.5 inches in diameter, and they depicted Major Lague Baseball (MLB) players in a wide variety of colors that collectors today love to hunt down. The award for the scarcest sports





boxes, an uncut complete box will bring a premium price," says Oregon-based giveaways collector Ray Berg. "I remember buying those in 1971. I wish I'd held onto them all those years ago!"

Berg has made up for letting go of his original Milk Duds boxes by since putting together a complete set of the boxes, and he's not done yet. "My Milk Duds set is my most treasured part of my collection. Now I just want to upgrade the ones I have to a higher grade. In fact, earlier today, a Roberto Clemente Milk Duds box, graded a 9 by [grading/ certification company] PSA, came on eBay. I have a 5 in my set, so that's one that I really want. It's an auction, starting at \$2,499 ... I made the seller an offer of \$2,000, waiting to hear back on that.'

The early 1970s also saw the introduction of Kellogg's 3-D sports cards, which the cereal maker inserted into boxes of its cereal. The Kellogg's cards-baseball and football-were unusual in that they were plastic, and were made using a lenticular process, which gave them an illusion of depth, particularly when moved back and forth. But this feature means that surviving Kellogg's cards often suffer from cracking of the plastic finish. "Heat can affect them ... going from heat to cold also can damage them," warns Tony Greco. "I had a number of 1975 Kellogg's cards in our garage and in the attic at one point, and a lot of those cracked on me." The cereal maker offered the cards in its boxes until the early 1980s.

#### LIQUID INVESTMENT

Beverage manufacturers eventually jumped on the giveaway bandwagon. In 1958, Hires Root

Beer included a baseball card in cartons of its product, and it was an unusual piece of cardboard. Attached to the baseball card along its bottom edge, with a perforation, was a wedge-shaped card that served a dual purpose: it invited the owner of the card to join the Hires baseball club by tearing off the wedge card, filling it out, and sending it in to the company; and it acted as a tab that held the whole thing in the carton of root beer bottles. Unsurprisingly, most surviving Hires cards are missing the wedge tab, which makes complete examples that much more desirable.

metal. They featured the player name, team, and position on the back

instead of the front, like the 1962 coins. And then there were Slurpee cups. In 1972, 7-11 convenience stores started offering sweet drinks in plastic cups bearing the likeness of MLB players on the front, with the player's information and team logo on the back. Two new cups were issued each week, and the company continued the program in 1973 with additional players added to the series. The 7-11 sports cups were hugely popular and are today fairly easy to find. But they often have at least minor wear due to 7-11, and then subsequent owners, "nesting" the cups together to save space, which often resulted in the lithographed artwork and text getting smudged and scratched. 7-11 went on to produce cups showing NBA basketball players, DC and Marvel comic book heroes, and various other series.


Both Berg and Greco see the Kellogg's 3-D cards as being a strong category in the giveaway/oddball collecting market. "Over the last 10

In 1962, Salada Tea began inserting plastic baseball coins into packages of its product, a move that still has collectors scratching their heads 60 years later. How many kids drank tea in 1962, and how many of them would bug their mothers to buy that box of herbal chamomile to get a Rocky Colavito coin? Despite the strange marketing strategy, Salada coins are very popular with collectors of oddball and giveaway items. Junket Pudding also put the baseball coins in its packages, which makes some sense given that kids eat pudding. In addition, Shirriff potato chips put the coins in its packages for the Canadian market, along with offering coins of NHL hockey players in its packages of jelly and pudding.

Salada and Junket again offered baseball coins in 1963, but they now were made of

"The Roberto Clemente card in the 1971 Kellogg's set, in PSA 10, is really a prized piece. There's only about 25 of them [in PSA 10] known to exist, so that's one of the most desirable items

Greco sees them as low-hanging fruit for collectors. "The Kellogg's cereal cards are probably one of the easier items to go after because they're more recent than





## Tom Brady to Open Sports Shop in Vegas?


ESSENTIALLY SPORTS - Tom Brady has made news by stopping the construction of his Florida mansion. Initially, construction was going smoothly, but he has recently decided to put it on hold. Interestingly, reports are suggesting that Brady is now considering opening a sports shop in Las Vegas instead.

Brady recently posted a story on his Instagram from the Fontainebleau Hotel, FL, where he tagged his friend and the hotel owner, Jeff Soffer, but did not reveal the purpose of his visit. However, according to some sources, Brady is considering a location for his own sports memorabilia shop approximately 2,570 miles away from the Fontainebleau Hotels in Miami Beach, FL. The potential location being considered is at the Fontainebleau in Las Vegas, NV.

According to a "The Collectibles Guru" tweet in July, "Tom Brady will be opening his very own sports memorabilia shop at the Fontainebleau Resort & Casino in December 2023." This was based on an earlier tweet by the "Vital Vegas" blog that covers Las Vegas news and rumors: "Part owner of the Las Vegas Raiders, Tom Brady, will have a sports memorabilia shop at Fontainebleau."

Neither Brady nor the Fontainebleau Resorts & Casino have confirmed this news. Therefore, it remains unclear whether Brady is really planning to launch his own sports memorabilia shop or not.

Tom Brady's visit to the Fontainebleau Hotel in Florida also raised some eyebrows because of its proximity to his ex-wife's Miami mansion. Brady and Gisele Bündchen, who were married for 13 years, bought a \$17 million plot of land near the hotel in late 2020. They planned to build a home for their children there, using an LLC managed by executives from Fontainebleau Development. This company is owned by Jeff Soffer. After Brady and Bündchen split up, their construction project was put on hold, leaving their fans wondering what would happen next.



merican football is one of the most popular sports in the United States. Both college and National Football League (NFL) games draw huge crowds of team followers and all-around sports enthusiasts. Let's take a peek at some interesting, signed football-collecting facts and tips.

ANTIQUES PEEK

#### A Quick History of Football and Footballs in the U.S.

The first game we consider a true U.S. football game was a college game. It was between the universities now known as Princeton and Rutgers on November 6, 1869. At that time, football was more like rugby – teams used round balls that typically contained inflated pig bladders, creating the nickname "pigskin" for the football.

Early footballs had laces like the ones seen on footballs today but for an entirely different purpose. They literally held footballs together. Today, they exist to help players grip the balls better when throwing and catching. The shape and design of the ball itself also changed, going from a round to an oval-like shape. This can help you date original footballs, at least in part. Another indicator is what materials were used to make each one.

One of the biggest inventions that came along in the 1800s was vulcanized rubber, thanks to Charles Goodyear. The pliable, flexible rubber was later used in footballs after being patented by Mr. Goodyear in the 1830s.



#### The Popularity and **Rarity of Early Signed Footballs**

According to Antiques Roadshow's Simeon Lipman, both signed footballs and baseballs started popping up and being collected by fans in the 1920s. The difference – there were a lot more baseballs to go around. Footballs were much rarer because, at the time, only one per game was typically used. The football season was also shorter. At that time, college football teams were the most popular. The signatures of some of those players were highly sought-after.

Early signatures from certain Notre Dame players were and still are popular. For example, the Four Horsemen are known to this day as one of the most famous backfield

quartets in college football history. They were coached by the famous Knute Rockne. The group was comprised of fullback Elmer Layden, Quarterback Harry Stuhldreher, right halfback Don Miller, and left halfback Jim Crowley.

#### More Popular Football Names to Collect

Today, individual football player signatures from the past and present are held in high regard by generations of fans. Some names that stand out include Reggie White, Tom Brady, Vince Lombardi, and Joe

Namath. Footballs featuring those signatures and signatures from other popular current or former players tend to have higher resale values.

The other popular football signatures to collect are from famous teams

or groups. For example, a ball signed by the Four Horseman and Mr. Rockne might be quite valuable. Another specific example is a ball that sold back in 2016 for over \$3,000 that was signed by 52 members of the Green Bay Packers championship team from 1967. As I write this (June 2023), a Green Bay Packers ball from 1966 is up for sale at a price of nearly \$10,000 by Steiner Sports Memorabilia. It has 48 signatures, including one of the favorites I mentioned above, Vince Lombardi.

#### **Types of Footballs With Signatures**

When it comes to collecting signed footballs, it's important to understand the difference between a game ball, a replica, or a souvenir ball. Game balls have a higher degree of rarity. Those used in championship games or other historically significant games also tend to have higher resale values.

Souvenir balls are easy to purchase and to have players sign. They look great on bookshelves and tend to have clearer signatures. However, they are not usually monetarily worth nearly as much. Their values are (usually) more in terms of sentiment and display ability.

Another important signed football difference is the difference between stamping and actual signing. Stamping started with baseballs after World War II. Demand was so high that two former baseball players started the Autograph Ball Company. It was so successful that stamped baseballs made by the company could be purchased right through until 2016.

Stamped footballs weren't quite as in demand, but the trend still popped up in that sport, too. Obviously, real signatures are valuable more

than stamped in terms of resale value.

Forged signatures, while not quite as common in football as in baseball, are still a concern. It's one thing if you see a player sign a ball with your own eyes. It's another if you buy it well after its supposed signing. Provenance is vital. Make sure you know exactly what you are purchasing. Learn the histories and signatures of your favorite players or teams. Seek out expert appraisal assistance when needed.

#### Ways to Rule Out Fake Football Signatures

The best way to make a final authentication of a football signature is to show it to an expert. However, you can start the authentication process easily enough on your own by ruling out obvious fakes.

Look for clear signs of mechanized or stamped signing or outright signature forgery. If a football has multiple signatures that are all in the same color of ink that could be a stamped ball. Players apply pressure to balls differently when they sign them and often have varying degrees of signature clarity from one another. If the signatures on a ball all look too similar in crispness or clarity, it could be stamped.

If the signatures all seem to start with small dots or end the same, that can indicate abrupt motions of mechanized signing. Or, if the ball appears old but the signatures appear new, that's a possible red flag.


In short, footballs and other football memorabilia are great to collect. However, when collecting for investment and resale value you need to use caution. Make sure you truly understand what you are buying and what its significance is. That way you can make the most of your investment.

And while you may think of him as the "tall sports guy," his background allows him to pinch-hit on any number of categories. Plus, his passion for trading cards pulled him into the business by establishing G.A.S. Trading Cards with the mission to "create highly collectible physical cards to honor the most iconic names in music, culture, the arts, and entertainment." This business allows Simeon to flex his visionary muscles by putting out trading cards that honor not only individuals, but musicians, pop icons, artists, and more.

When it comes to curating auctions and events, one of his most notable events include the groundbreaking Punk Sale held at Christie's Auction House in New York City, in 2008. This event celebrated the Punk aesthetic, and its cultural significance as both a historic music genre and a valid and extremely influential art movement with its distinct attitude, design, and ephemera.



I ran into Simeon by chance when he was in Sturbridge, Massachusetts filming an episode of *Antiques Roadshow* at Old Sturbridge Village. We followed that up with an interview over the phone where he shared his story, his thoughts on collecting, and what he is collecting now.

Here is what he shared with us.

#### What got you into collecting?

I was born a collector. I grew up around antiques. My father collected scientific instruments and other things in that genre, and my mom is an art teacher so I grew up learning a lot about art and art history and science. They used to go to garage sales and flea markets, and that was my favorite thing to do - go with them and they would let me explore. That was in the 1970s and 80s - a different time. They would let me go for a few hours and then meet back up at a certain time and place.

That freedom that they gave me allowed a curious kid like me to really discover a lot of interesting stuff – and I was taking it all in, starting to acquire knowledge about the past and building context

around each collectible. What year was it? What was going on in the sports world at that time? Who were the key players? What makes



this card, bat, or picture worth having? What gives it value? My search for those types of details drives my love of the business.

#### What do you collect?

My favorite thing is to collect trading cards. It's what brought me into the business in the first place.

Today, I am building my collection of photography. I love photographs of famous people before they were famous – original photos I can hold in my hand and take time to really look at them.

To me, that kind of stuff is fascinating, and it also kind of dovetails into what I'm currently kind of passionate about collecting, which are ticket stubs. Primarily, I love Broadway ticket stubs, featuring some of my favorite actors and actresses from over the years. One of my favorite things in my collection is one from October 19th, 1944. A play opened on Broadway called *I Remember Mama* and it featured a 20-year-old actor from Omaha making his Broadway debut that evening ... his

name was Marlon "Bud" Brando. This is a ticket stub to that very night's performance! The professional Broadway debut of perhaps the greatest actor of all time! This was the very, very beginning of his career, you know, and here is the ticket stub that was there in the room with him that night, and that's the kind of thing that's always driven me – as a collector and as an appraiser. It's that direct connection with the past.



Any time I have seen you appraising an item(s), I always appreciate your enthusiasm and willingness to share all kinds of information and stories that make it more relatable. You great respect for sports memorabilia, and the collectors seem to feed off of what you have to say.

Thank you. Researching a collection or even just a single item is the closest thing that I can think of to get to a place where you might never have been.

It is like collecting a ticket stub, whether it is to a Broadway play or the World Series. I wasn't born in the 1940s or earlier, and I couldn't have gone to this event, right? But, here is an artifact. A relic that was there and I can touch it. The whole basis of what I do *is* making that connection with the past or with the future, that's kind of where I'm at

as a fan, a collector, and an appraiser. That's what's my whole thing.

Really, when it comes to collectibles, it's almost like you get to take a trip back in time. You buy the ticket and take the souvenir with you and you remember the experience. That's the fun of this whole thing.

While you tend to stick to physical objects to both collect and appraise, new trends are popping up, especially in the world of sports collectibles – NFT (non-fungible tokens) are a hot topic right now, along with buying a percentage of an item vs. purchasing a historic collectible outright. How do you feel about these trends?

Personally, I prefer to collect things that I can have in my home or with my collection. There is something about being able to hold it in your hand, right?

That being said, there are good things about these forms of collecting and it mainly has to do with involving younger collectors in this business. Digital collectibles may best suit their lifestyle today and it gets them involved in the stories that go with the

image. When it comes to owning a percentage of an item, again, the younger collectors can grab onto the story that goes with it and hope their "asset" will gain in value over time.

Then there are those who invest and expect a return. This type of collecting is for people who are looking for an interesting way to invest, but it involves a more personal approach – different from those who collect because they are passionate about something.

When it comes to appraisals, collectibles that are graded have a large amount of value coming from that grade. Should collectors be spending the money to get their items graded?

There are some grading companies that have worked hard to determine a rating system for items that include trading cards and comics, etc. We often say, "Condition is everything," and when that is backed up by an independent grading company it does weigh heavily when determining value.

Not everyone needs to get their cards and comics and uniforms, etc., graded. Often, if the owner thinks the item is of considerable value and they are looking to sell at auction, the auction house will pay to get the item graded. And, for the average collector, they may wish to get certain pieces graded depending upon perceived value for something such as a legal matter or a will or something like that. Otherwise, it is a good idea to learn how to preserve what you have, properly frame and display your collection, and see about getting certain pieces appraised by a pro-

fessional such as PSA, CSG, or CGC (for comics).

#### ntiques Roadshow

What should sports collectors consider when deciding what to bring to an AR appraisal event?

Consider bringing something with some age. New collectibles generally do not have enough history to go along with assigning a value. Another thing to con-sider bringing is a cross-collectible. A player's jersey that has been signed and was game-worn on a historic game can bring out more information for the collec-tor and typically more value.

Every city we travel to is different, and we are always discovering new local treasures that we are happy to be given the chance to value.

# How much prep work do you do before you conduct an appraisal on AR?

While every appraiser brings their own in-depth knowledge with them, we have staff that are hitting up information online, and we always confer with each other no matter what we are appraising.

Because I have a varied background in many collectible fields, I will confer with other departments and even conduct an on-camera appraisal if I have the knowledge. It can take a while even a few hours— between selecting something that looks like it could be really interesting and then looking up and going on-camera to film the appraisal.

#### What is your typical day of appraising like?

We all interact with collectors within our department and others all day long as hundreds of items come to us from very long lines. It is a long day but it is an adventure.

A good day of appraising for me means I was able to show three items that are worthy of being presented on-camera. Then I know I did my job and I'll be seen on upcoming episodes.



hances are that if you have a sports collection, you have at least one bobblehead figure – if not a few. They're easy to display and give a neat, kitsch tone to your otherwise serious-as-heck memorabilia zone. You can't look at a bobblehead and not crack a smile.

#### **Ancient History**

The bobblehead, believe it or not, dates back to the 1700s. According to the National Bobblehead Hall of Fame, bobbleheads, or "nodders" as they were known, were imported from China to England. These were more akin to statues than the bobbles we know today; however, the heads had similar motions.

Jump ahead for two hundred or so years, and you'll see the first iterations of the bobbles

for North American sports. These were short, stumpy generic figurines outfitted with the uniform of a particular sports team or paying tribute to superstars at the time. Nearly every figure featured an elongated neck, allowing the head to move without damaging the body (in theory). Among the latter depictions were figurines of baseball legends like Roberto Clemente and Mickey Mantle. As you can imagine, the toys were very commonly played with, and, as a result, finding figures in any sort of good condition is rare.

What is interesting about this period was the variations in size. While manufacturers built most at sizes allowing children to easily play with and collect them, there were also extremely limited fifteen-inch figures crafted for promotional purposes. Not surprisingly, these figures are among the most sought-after today and can quite easily command five figures at auction.

During the early 1960s, the market for generic "nodders" grew to include African American athletes, as well. These nonspecific bobbles continued into the 1970s, but their generic form didn't hold interest. Ultimately, the figures disappeared from store shelves.

Initially, new bobbleheads carried similarities to the originals. The majority had standard poses, standing tall and proud, albeit with slimmer bodies. These bobbles more closely resembled the bodies of their athletic counterparts rather than the chubby childlike incarnations collectors knew well. The heads were also more detailed, following closer to the player rather than being left to interpretation by the collector.

While the Giants had ignited the stadium giveaway, bobbleheads quickly found themselves on store shelves as mainstream products. Kids clamored to get as many bobbleheads as possible while investors wreaked havoc in aisles,

#### Returning to the line-up

For most collectors, bobbleheads re-emerged in the early 2000s when companies sought a new hot collectible. The new edition of the craze started in 1999, as documented by the National Bobblehead Hall of Fame:

Bobbleheads seemed to be 20th-century relics by the turn of the century until a promotion by the San Francisco Giants brought the bobblehead back to the public eye. The Giants offered a Willie Mays bobblehead to the first 20,000 visitors on May 9th to celebrate the 40th anniversary of Candlestick Park, which was the last year of the Giants playing at that stadium. The promotion went very well, and more teams began to offer bobbleheads as a promotional item for their fans.

Looking at that Mays figurine now, you can see there was an obvious tribute to the original design. Decidedly chubby,

Mays' piece had an authentic look that resonated with

children and adults who had the original version of the "Say Hey Kid's" bobble in the 1960s.

searching for rare variants that occasionally popped up. Sports card companies got in on the act, partnering with producers or creating their own figurines. Among the companies that capitalized on the craze was Pacific, who, to help promote their Heads Up card-andbobble line, issued a figure of their owner, Mike Cramer.

Like many pieces in an era when sports memorabilia struggled to maintain a continual audience, bobbleheads fell by the wayside. While the mainstream pieces have almost completely disappeared from stores and shelves, they continue to have an audience in

the secondary market thanks to the continuation of the figures as stadium giveaways. These pieces are getting closer to realistic proportions, albeit the heads are still oversized. There is also some fun mixed into these pieces, with some fantastical elements mixing sports and other themes.

Ultimately, bobbleheads will not be disappearing from sports memorabilia consciousness anytime soon. They are niche and do not have the mainstream popularity they once enjoyed, but they are fun pieces to pick up and can carry good value as well. Jon Waldman is a Winnipeg-based writer. ## **Bobbleheads at Auction**



#### Connor McDavid Bobblehead

Hockey fans of the Edmonton Oilers can't get enough of Connor McDavid – or, it seems, pay enough for a larger-than-life version of Edmonton's hockey hero. This past March, a 6'7" tall Connor McDavid bobblehead, autographed by the

superstar himself—one of only two in existence—went for \$7,600 at an auction to benefit the Edmonton Oilers Community Foundation (EOCF).



#### 1975 Eagles Bobbleheads

A listing for 21 cases of 12/case New/Unopened/ Mint 1975 Eagles Bobble Head dolls sold for \$16,500 on eBay. The cardboard cases holding the bobbleheads are in near-mint condition. Each bobblehead has a value of

\$99.95 or \$1,200/case. The sold price is just over half of this stated value.



#### Promo Bobblehead

The holy grail of baseball bobbleheads, a 14-inch-tall bobblehead created to promote a series of smaller versions that would be available across the country, sold through Heritage Auctions in 2019 for \$90,000. The ultra-rare relic was manufactured in Japan and consigned by the

grandson of a Japanese national and co-owner of the Otagiri Mercantile Company which distributed it nearly 60 years ago.



#### 1961 NY Yankees Bobblehead

This 1961 New York Yankees bobblehead appeared on eBay, valued at \$59,750. Like other

highly valuable bobbleheads, this example does not feature any particular player. This is just one of two in existence, and that is how it commanded such a high price.



49ers Bobblehead

A jumbo 15" NFL bobblehead made in the early 1960s and styled as a player for the San Francisco 49ers. It was distributed by the Otagiri Mercantile Company out of Japan in the 1950s. While the jumbo versions were intended

as an incentive to buy the smaller ones, it is estimated that only around five jumbo bobbleheads were made per NFL team as they were listed back in the '50s. Jumbos were most likely made by hand-painting on molded ceramic pieces. Today's bobbleheads are made of plastic.



#### Kobe

This is a 3-foot-tall Kobe Bryant LA Lakers bobblehead. This rare example is number 55 of just 100 bobbleheads made in this series with the #8 jersey as seen. Great for any collector to fill their collections with special editions. Asking \$5,000 on eBay.

Live demonstrations of traditional crafts such as bobbin lace weaving and spinning,




doll making, bookbinding, pottery molding, and pottery decoration will also be featured. Crafters will sell their wares and offer instruction on these pre-industrial trades.



## Antique Pavilion's "World Tour" with Japanese Woodblock Prints Gallery and Antique Articles

BOUCKVILLE, NY – Since 1990, Patti Bourgeois and Sandie Fowler have participated in the August Madison-Bouckville Week. Pats Pots and Antique Articles will be on the Antique Pavilion field under a large 20 x 50-foot tent. Collectively, they will offer American and European Art Pottery, vintage metal bookends from the US and

abroad, woodblock prints from Japan, France, and beyond, and antique tiles.



Japanese Shin-hanga Woodblock Prints by Master Kawase Hasui (1883–1957)

Patti will introduce a collection of shin-hanga surimono woodblock prints by Japanese Master Kawase Hasui (1883– 1957). Hasui produced dreamlike qualities in his prints, yearning for rural roots and the warm wooden architec-

ture that was disappearing in urban Tokyo. Hasui's publisher, Shozaburo Watanabe coined the term "shin-hanga" in 1915, which simply translates to "new print." He was the most important publisher of shin-hanga, which was directed primarily to foreign markets. Shin-hanga prints appealed to Western taste for nostalgic and romanticized views of Japan, and flourished, enjoying

immense popularity in the U.S.



In the 1920s, there were articles on shin-hanga in the *International Studio*, the *Studio*, the *Art News* and the *Art Digest* magazines. In 1921, a Shinsaku-hanga Tenrankai ("New Creative Print Exhibition") was held in Tokyo. One hundred and fifty works by ten artists were exhibited. In 1930 and 1936, two major shin-hanga exhibitions were held at the Toledo Museum of Art in Ohio. They were the largest showcases of shin-hanga prints at the time.

Look for the pottery, antique tile, and Japanese woodblock prints signs on the tent.





## Madison-Bouckville "Antique Week" Show Fields



## History of Madison-Bouckville Antique Week & Madison-Bouckville Promotions

By John Mancino, president, Madison-Bouckville Promotions

ver fifty years ago this August, Jock Hengst and a few of his friends got together on an abandoned airfield on Route 20 in Bouckville to swap some antiques. From that humble beginning has grown New York State's largest outdoor antique event.

After a few years the event was moved to a cornfield on Rte. 20 and continued to prosper. As the event grew, many full-time antique stores sprang up along Rte. 20, and the towns of Madison and Bouckville became known as antique communities. Many of these stores started hosting their own shows running concurrent with Mr. Hengst's.

When Mr. Hengst sold his show field to a farmer several years ago, there was concern that the show was over. When I heard the news I knew something must be done to keep this show alive. I went up and down the street and organized all the antique stores, show fields, restaurant owners, and innkeepers. We all got together in one room, and with the help of Madison County Tourism formed Madison-Bouckville Promotions. We are a non-profit group consisting of over 70 members. Monies raised from dues are used to advertise Madison-Bouckville Antique Week. 



**Oz-Mania** 

just came from an interesting house call this morning. It was most interesting not because of the number of books I bought, which was only 32 books, or for the number of those books that were first editions, because none of them were first editions. But the interesting thing for me was that they were all Wizard of Oz books, by far the most that I've ever bought in one fell swoop.

Probably just about everyone knows the first Wizard of Oz book was originally printed in 1900, but maybe you didn't know that the book was so popular that the author L. Frank Baum contented their series

with 13 more titles and at least two other authors who continued the series after Baum's death.

And they were all in good to very good condition and nine of them even had most or all of their dust jackets, although a few were raggedy and missing chunks. Now normally when dust jackets are damaged or missing from collectible books that is the kiss o' death as far as collectibility and value are concerned. But in book collecting there are often exceptions. Yes, of course, they would have been worth more if they all had perfect dust jackets, but on the other hand, I have to take what I can get and I thought I was very lucky to get these.

The good part was the condition of the books was above average and they did not have torn pages and weren't scribbled in which is often the case with older children's books.

Until I checked my reference, I had maybe thought that this was all of them - or at least all of the core titles, but alas they were only complete up through number XXX, Captain Salt in Oz, plus two more later titles. Depending on how you count them, including the original 14 main titles by L. Frank Baum, the 19 titles by Ruth Plumly Thompson who continued the series to 1939, plus the three titles by John R. Neil up to 1942, there are 36 main titles to that point. There are several more after that, but I can't get into those right now.

white plates and no color plates guarantees that none of them were first editions of the early titles, which is what I wanted to know as I didn't want to have to study the volumes as to the other points that would have identified the first printings if I did not have to. This might have taken some time as many of the titles can be complicated.

The reference I brought along in case I needed it was Bibliographia Oziana by Hanff, Greene, Martin, Greene, and Haff published by the

International Wizard of Oz Club, revised and enlarged edition, 1988. With reference books, it's best to get the latest edition rather than the first edition and later editions might have more info in them.

Other quick tricks to use on Wizard of Oz titles are that up to #12 Tin Woodsman of Oz, all the Oz books were first published by Reilly & Britton. In 1919 a new publisher, Reilly & Lee, took over the Oz books so any of the first 13 titles published by Reilly & Lee are guaranteed to be reprints, so that is another easy check. Now after 1919, Reilly & Lee did the first

editions of the later reprints.

So, if I see someone with a copy of the first title The Wizard of Oz that they claim is a first edition and it has the Reilly & Lee imprint, it is not. But I should add that seeing a copy of The Wizard of Oz with the Reilly & Britton imprint does not make it a first edition either because the original title of the book when it was first printed in 1900 was The Wonderful Wizard of Oz.

When I got them all back to the shop, the first thing I did was to carefully repair the fragile dust jackets with acid-free archival mending tape and cover them with mylar dust jacket protectors to keep them nice!

And that was my interesting and fun morning!

Although the nice lady I bought these from told me that none of them were first editions, I double-checked just to make sure, but she was correct. The quick way I checked was to fan the pages of each to see if any of them had color plates as the first editions of all but two of these titles were originally issued with color plates, that is full page color illustrations placed throughout the text. Now up to about 1935, the reprints would have had color plates, too, so while color plates did not guarantee that the book is a first edition, but them having all black and

#### Hi David –

I found out about you from the Journal of Antiques & Collectibles and hope you can help me.

I inherited a framed, 2-sided document that measures approximately 9.25 inches by 3 inches (photos attached).

I have difficulty reading it, but I believe it is a NY state document concerning indentured servants, dating from 1805/1806.

I am looking for options to either sell it or donate it; is this something I can either sell or donate?

Thank you, Mike

Hello Mike and thank you for a very intriguing item to appraise. I have no doubt that this antique document itself is original and genuine, but I do not believe it is an indenture document.

This wonderful legal writ was created using vellum paper, probably a quill pen, and iron oxide ink as was the fashion in 1806. In the early 1800s, vellum would have been used on legal documents such as indentures and court documents. On the front left, you will notice the back side of the New York State seal and how "puffy" it looks. That is one of the telltale signs of vellum instead of cloth or rag paper. Cloth paper would have been used for periodicals etc.

The ink was black when this document was written, but now it is faded and red in color because the ink has iron oxide in it to give it substance. I also detected a quill pen was used by the thin and thick strokes shown in the writing. Finally, the writing style is similar to other documents I have read from the late 18th or early 19th century.

I have tried to translate this document and have been successful in most of the wording, but not all. It is my opinion that below is how the document reads. I would have to see this document in person to view and study to see if I should decipher the writing differently.

Front side: Far left is the Seal of the Supreme Court of New York:

"The people of the state of New York to the Sheriff of the city and county of New York greeting: We command you that you take Joseph Tremain George Scott and Lewis Katen if they may live in your jail which ^ and thus falsely keep ^ so that you may have them in Liu *(lieu)* before our justice of our Supreme court of Judicature at the city of Albany on the fifth Monday of February next to answer unto Dudley Walsh and Henry Buckman assigned of Joseph Constant Sheriff of the City and County of New York in a plea of Trespass and also to a bill of the said Dudley and Henry for sixteen hundred dollars of debt upon bail bond before our paid Jurist accordingly to the curators of our jail court then and there to be enlisted and have you then there this event witness James Kent Esquire our Chief Justice of the City of New York on the 23rd day of November. I. Q. Wilson In the year one thousand eight hundred and five. Favhro *(or Fairho)* and Bloodgood"

On the back left side of the document:

"3 men are to appeal at the receipt of this writ and may the Lord to grant any appearance on order – | Joseph Tremain | George Scott | Filed February 11th, 1806"

On the back right side of the document:

"JUD Court | Dudley Walsh Henry Buckman assigned of J Constant | Or | Joseph Tremain | George Scott | and Lewis Katen | Ret 1 Puose In 1805 | 103 I. Q. Wilson | Tremain, G Scott | Taken Fees | Joseph Constant | Sheriff

Given the above translation, I conclude that this is a letter written

in November 1805 by Attorneys Favro and Bloodgood representing the peoples of New York to New York City (NYC) and County Sheriff Joseph Constant (Sheriff of NYC and county in 1805) regarding the imprisonment of Joseph Tremain, George Scott, and Lewis Katen, instructing Constant to have them before the Supreme Court of Judicature in Albany NY on the 5th Monday of February 1806. Further instruction is given regarding two more men being held by Joseph Constant—Dudley Walsh and Henry Buckman —on a charge of trespassing and the \$1600 debt on

a bail bond. This letter also mentions New York Supreme Court Chief Justice James Kent (1763-1847) in February 1806. The document appears to have been written by and or witnessed by an I.Q. Wilson of Favhro and Bloodgood.

Some might look at this document and read it differently, but the important thing is that this 1805/1806 Court document mentions not only victims or perpetrators but crime and bail bonds (and \$1,600 was a lot of money in 1805 – in today's money it would be \$49,590). It mentions New York City Chief Justice James Kent an important player in NYC politics in the early 1800s—but no signature. NYC and County Sheriff Joseph Constant has signed the document, along with George Scott, Joseph Tremain, Lewis Katen, and I. Q. Wilson.

Most importantly, this is a fun historical read!

Now, I must add a caveat. I am in no way an expert in 1805 NYC and County law, nor do I specialize in authenticating autographs. To value autographs, always get them authenticated by an expert that issues authentication documents. Check for one that has the best overall bio and

reviews regarding authentication.

That said, I will only give you an idea of value based on if this document is authentic. I could not find any autograph of Sheriff Joseph Constant from 1805 – his signature is probably the most important.

Given the subject matter and signatures, I estimate that if I were to see this document for sale in NYC with authentication papers, I would expect to pay an estimated \$250+. If it had Chief Justice of the NYC Supreme Court James Kent's signature and authentication papers, the value could be hundreds of dollars more.

Whether you keep, sell, or donate this writ is completely up to you. To sell this, I would get this document and its signatures authenticated with authentication papers. I would then choose an upper-end auction house in NYC or one with NYC clients and get their opinion of value. If I donated it, I would want to see it go back home to NYC and into a museum that would display it. Many museums will give donors a receipt of value for the donated item. It is best to check all the benefits before choosing to sell or donate.

This document is a wonderful small look into early 1800s NYC and County law. What a conversation piece! Until you decide what to do with it, Mike, hang it up and enjoy it.

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## As Summer Arrived, Pop Culture Boomed

t's not unusual for the heat of summer to bring some hot auction results, and it looks like this season is not going to be an exception to that truism. In the pop culture space, Heritage, ComicConnect, and Hake's all have had some attention-grabbers.

#### HERITAGE

When Heritage Auctions' four-day June 22-25, 2023 Comics & Comic Art Signature Auction closed, the grand total was \$21,056,657, but that only tells part of the story. This one, observers quickly found out, went big from the start.

In its Thursday first session, Frank Frazetta's Dark Kingdom painting original art took a big swing, selling for \$6 million. The painting was first published as the cover for Karl Edward Wagner's 1976 Kane series novel, Dark Crusade. The Dark Kingdom sale has set a new record for a Frazetta painting, besting the Egyptian Queen original art that sold for \$5.4 million at Heritage in 2019.

Following Frazetta's painting, the top five sellers were anchored by major key

comic books. A CGC-certified 9.2 copy of

Captain America Comics #1 CGC 9.2 hammered at \$810,000 (the CGC 3.5 Promise Collection copy of that issue also made the top ten at \$168,000). A CGC 3.0 copy of Superman #1 sold for \$360,000. A CGC 8.0 copy of Amazing Fantasy #15 realized \$312,000, and a CGC 9.4 Amazing Spider-Man #1 brought \$264,000.

On the art side, again just the first day, Joe Simon and Jack Kirby's Captain America Comics #5 splash page 1 sold for \$252,000, and Bill Watterson's March 28, 1986, Calvin and Hobbes daily comic strip original art reached \$174,000.

The auction saw comics made for kids draw the interest of serious collectors, including Richie Rich #1 CGC 9.6 that hammered for \$108,000 - setting a new record for the book. It is one of just four copies at this grade with none higher, and more than double the previous record of \$48,995 that Heritage set in May 2016.

Back on the original art front, Batman villain Bane's creator Graham Nolan offered several original pages from his archives, including five pages from his debut in Batman: Vengeance of Bane #1 that sold for a combined \$300,240. The splash page from that issue showing Bane in full costume and mask went for \$90,000.

Bill Sienkiewicz's New Mutants #25 page that introduced Legion, the son of Professor X and Gabrielle Haller, brought \$93,000.

#### **COMICCONNECT**

ComicConnect's Event Auction #54, which closed on June 5-9, 2023, produced a steady string of headline-ready results with Journey into Mystery #83 9.4 leading all bids at \$350,400.

Top auction sales included Batman #1 2.0 for \$176,500, Iron Man #1 9.9 for \$106,000, Superman #1 2.0 for \$281,750, and Suspense Comics #11 9.8 Promise Collection for \$147,000.

Golden Age highlights included Beware Terror Tales #6 9.4 Crowley for \$21,850, Blue Bolt #112 9.0 for \$19,822, All-Star Comics #8 2.5 for \$27,000, and Tales from the Crypt #46 9.4 for \$17,500.

Silver, Bronze, and Modern Age sales included Amazing Spider-Man #129 9.8 for \$23,000, Incredible Hulk #1 8.0 for \$111,157, Iron Man #1 9.8 for

\$27,100, New Mutants #98 9.9 for \$40,250, Sub-Mariner #1 9.8 for \$9,400, Thor #165 9.8 for \$25,000, and Ultimate Fallout #4 9.8 Stan Lee Signature variant edition for \$43,000.

Art sales were led by the Incredible Hulk #154 cover by Herb Trimpe for \$83,375, Conan the Barbarian #12 cover by Gil Kane for \$66,701, Weird Science #21 page by Wally Wood for \$46,000, and Amazing Spider-Man #325 page by Todd McFarlane for \$39,905.

#### HAKE'S

While two weeks away from closing as we go to press, it's worth noting that Hake's Auctions opened their July 25-26 Auction #238 with some fireworks as well. In just two days of bidding, the premier auction set two major house records.

On Monday, July 3, the auction set an opening day record with \$654,000 in bids. The next day, on Independence Day, they hit the \$1 million mark faster than any auction in the company's long history.

The expected top offering in the auction is a CGC-certified 9.6 copy of Amazing Spider-Man #1, the character's second appearance. This high-grade specimen of the key issue retells Spider-Man's origin and sees the debuts of Daily Bugle publisher J. Jonah Jameson and the villainous Chameleon. It

J.C. Vaughn is the Vice-President of Gemstone Publishing. Gemstone's Amanda Sheriff is Gemstone's Editor –Digital.

also includes the first Fantastic Four crossover.

This fresh-to-market example was in a private collection for 25 years and is one of only five copies at the grade (with only two certified higher at 9.8).

A CGC-certified 7.5 copy of Amazing Fantasy #15, featuring Spider-Man's first appearance, as well as the introductions of Aunt May and Uncle Ben, is also featured in the auction.

A Star Wars Boba Fett rocket -firing prototype, a 1977 original comic art page by Howard Chaykin from Marvel's Star Wars #1 (which actually predates the release of the movie), the JFK Big Four "Democracy for Jack Kennedy" rare 1960 U.S. Capitol portrait button, and the 1910-1912 Sweet Caporal Cigarettes highgrade complete set of 204 buttons featuring many Hall of Fame baseball players are also among the notables in this highly watchable auction.



## Holabird's 4-Day High-Grade Auction Results

RENO, NV – Five 19th century gold and silver ingots from the Gold Rush and Silver Rush sold for a combined \$159,807 at a huge, four-day high-grade auction held June 15th through 18th by Holabird Western Americana Collections, online and live in the gallery at 3555 Airway Drive (Suite 308) in Reno, Nevada. The sale featured nearly 2,000 lots of mining collectibles, railroadiana, numismatics, Native and general Americana, philatelic, bottles, stocks, bonds, sports and art.

But it was the ingots (blocks of steel, gold, silver, or other metal, typically oblong in shape) that captured the attention of bidders. The top achiever was an 1880 Mathey, Kustel & Riotte silver ingot, which stood out from the others in terms of documented information, provenance, and history surrounding the assayers whose names were on it. It is the only known example from Mathey, Kustel & Riotte and carried their logo punch and weighed 4.97 troy ounces (\$42,175).

A close second was the 1883 Peck Mine silver ingot from Prescott, in the Arizona Territory; George Ralph, assayer. The mine was discovered by Ed Peck in 1875. The ingot,

trapezoidal in shape, was 4.52 troy ounces of silver fine 990 (\$38,560). An important rectangular silver ingot made by Edward Ruhling and engraved by Nye & Company of Virginia City, Nevada in 1869 for William Sharon, the infamous King of the Comstock, weighing 4.90 troy ounces, hit \$37,500.

A post-1890 silver and gold ingot from the Gould & Curry Silver Mining Company in Virginia City ("14.85 oz, .0285 fine gold, value \$8.74; 963 fine silver, value \$18.58"), showing the G & C bullion punch, found a new owner for \$23,497; while a Conrad Weigand silver-gold ingot, No. 7091, 4.40 ounces of .558 fine silver and .0155 fine gold, different from other Conrad Weigand ingots and a classic dore bar from a silver-gold deposit (plus probably copper), made \$18,075.

Other highlights include a pictorial business card for the Cripple Creek & Victor Stage Company in Colorado ("Do not miss a stage ride over the mountains") with a vignette of a six-horse Concord stagecoach, appearing to date to 1898-1899, that brought \$2,500. A pair of original Revolutionary War drumsticks, owned by James Baldwin, born in Saybrook, Middlesex County, Conn., with provenance and a handwritten note from 1867, both 19 inches in length, commanded \$3,875.

This auction offered 513 lots of art and general Americana, including a Wells Fargo agent letter from J. Hume regarding a Montana stage robbery in 1885, along with supporting ancillary documents—an important discovery from the man who caught the notorious outlaw Black Bart—left the room for \$3,875. A first edition directory of the

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city of Nevada and Grass Valley, California from 1861 by Hugh H. Thompson (San Francisco), containing a history of the city, the names of its inhabitants, and other information, 128 pages, finished at \$2,875.

Also, a remarkable archive from a legal Nevada prostitute, Kathy Eastland (aka "Destyny"), who collected memorabilia and photographs from her 15 years working the "ranches" (circa 1998-2003) changed hands for \$5,750.

A copy of a guide for pioneers and prospectors titled *Horn's Overland Guide* from 1852 from the U.S. Indian Sub-Agency,

the guide starting at Council Bluffs on the Missouri River and over land to Sacramento, California, written by Hosea B. Horn and published by J. H. Colton, made \$5,500.

Anyone owning a collection that might fit into a Holabird Western Americana Collections auction is encouraged to get in touch. The firm travels throughout the U.S. and will travel to inspect

most collections.

'n North America, summer, especially late summer, is butterfly season. Multiple generations hatch as caterpillars grow, pupate, and emerge to pollinate flowers and lay eggs of their own.

If you would prefer a butterfly that lasts longer, they often appear in decorative arts and jewelry, like this pin or pendant that sold for \$594 at New Orleans Auction Galleries. Real-life butterflies are admired for the striking colors and patterns of their wings, but this pin dazzles with gemstones. Its colors come from about 1.72 carats of sapphires.

While the name of the stone is synonymous with a brilliant shade of blue, sapphires can come in many other colors, as they do here. About 2.90 carats of diamonds add more sparkle (and value!) to the pin. They are rose cut, an old shape with irregular facets meant to preserve the



original size and shape of the stone. Today, most diamonds in jewelry are brilliant cut, a style that was developed in the 18th century to create more facets on the stone and reflect more light.

You won't see a butterfly like this one in your garden! This butterfly-shaped pin sparkles with multicolored sapphires and antique-cut diamonds.

ntique advertising and store signs are popular collectibles and decorations. Sometimes, the makers are as interesting as the L Lsubjects. This butcher's sign, made of painted cast iron, sold for \$1,188 at an auction by Cowan's (Hindman). It was made by the Bernard Gloekler company.

The eponymous Bernard Gloekler, who immigrated to the United States from Germany, started his factory and shop in Pittsburgh. He had previously trained as a gunsmith but took his mechanical talents in a different direction: making industrial kitchen equipment for shops, restaurants, and hotels. By the early 20th century, they were doing business all over the United States. When Gloekler died in 1911, his son Charles took over the company.

The design seen on this sign, a saw, cleaver, and knife with a standing

bull for a finial, appears on many other Gloekler pieces. For example, a smaller version may be used as a crest on butcher's racks. Maybe keep Gloekler in mind at your next barbecue!

We may not know who this sign was for, but it was made by the Bernard Gloekler Company of Pennsylvania. They made kitchen equipment for restaurants, hotels, and butcher shops.

Wear your old jewelry, especially the pieces that look old. You will be surprised how many will ask Terry Kovel

Q: I'd like to know the value of a porcelain vase that was my grandmother's. It has pink and yellow flowers on a white background. The vase is cylindrical, tapered slightly in the middle, and is 12 inches tall and about 4 inches wide. The bottom is marked with what looks like a bag tied with a ribbon with the words "Willets" above and "Belleek" below.

A: Belleek, a cream-colored porcelain with a pearly glaze, was first made in Ireland in the 1860s. In the 1880s, Willets Manufacturing Company was one of a few American companies that made Belleek. The mark is a snake, whose body makes three loops forming a triangular shape. Willets closed around 1912. New Jersey China Pottery Co. made pottery with the Willets Belleek name until about 1914. Value depends on size, decoration, and condition. A 12-inch vase painted with flowers sold last year for \$90.

**Q:** We own a 1954 White Furniture Company "Colleton Collection" dining room set which includes a table with chairs, breakfront, and credenza. We'd like to know what it's worth.

A: Brothers William E. and David A. White began making furniture in Mebane, North Carolina (NC), in 1881. It was incorporated as White Rickel Furniture Co. in 1896 after A.J. Rickel invested in the company. Rickel sold his interest in 1899 and the name became White Furniture Co. In a 1946 magazine ad for "Collecton Collection" dining room furniture, the company claimed to be "the south's oldest makers of fine furniture." The company merged with Hickory Manufacturing Co. of Hickory, NC, in 1988 and the name became Hickory White Co. The factory in Mebane closed in 1993. Value depends on the desirability of the style, type of wood, and condition. A mahogany double pedestal table sold for \$650, and a walnut round table with two leaves and six chairs sold for \$300.

**Q:** A very heavy wooden chest was dropped off at our local transfer location and given to us because neighbors know we like odd pieces of furniture. We had to use a forklift to move it. We think it is a bridal chest from the early 20th century. It is 43 x 78 1/2 x 27 1/2 inches. The lid has remnants of heavily decorated painted pasteboard panels. The interior is cedar. Does it have any value?

A: Large wooden bridal chests in good condition can sell for a few hundred dollars. Size, provenance, and condition, or a well-known maker, help determine the price. Chests that are too heavy to move easily or are in poor condition don't sell well. The peeling pasteboard panels on your chest would be difficult to restore. A heavily European-decorated bridal chest from the second half of the 19th century was up for auction last year. It was in poor condition and listed as "difficult to move." It didn't sell, even though the starting bid was listed as \$150. You might find someone who enjoys taking on a project, but the weight will keep most people from tackling it.










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
